CLASS PROJECT

Your class may be inspired by One Vote, Two Votes, I Vote, You Vote

Hold an election for class president and vice president. As a class, discuss and determine the duties and responsibilities of the offices and their duration. Accept nominations, and encourage all students to find ways to participate, whether they run for office or work to support a candidate by making posters or volunteering to register voters. Brainstorm questions for the candidates as a class, and hold a debate before holding the election itself.

Elect a class mascot. Have students brainstorm a list of animals that might make a good mascot to represent your class. Vote, using a show of hands, to narrow the list to the top two choices. Form two parties, and align an animal candidate with each. Let students choose which party to join, and encourage them to work together to research their animal candidate. Have both parties use photographs and facts about their animal to create a campaign video. Make sure all voters have the opportunity to watch the videos and get to

VOTER REGISTRATION: Having your students register to vote helps reinforce this important step in the voting process. Act as the registrar, and provide student voters with Voter Registration Cards (can be index cards or downloadable cards). Each student can fill in his

BALLOT BOX: Where will your voters place their completed ballots until it is time to count the votes? Make a ballot box. Students can decorate an empty tissue box or shoe box and cut a

THE VOTING BOOTH: Have students research what voting booths look like. What ideas do they have for creating a private space for voting? Let kids take the lead in designing a voting
