


# BECOMING VANESSA

For readers of Alma and How She Got Her Name and The King of Kindergarten, this story will help kids just starting school transform from timid caterpillars into beautiful butterflies so they can love who they are.

On Vanessa's first day of school, her parents tell her it will be easy to make friends. Vanessa isn't so sure. She wears her fanciest outfit so her new classmates will be able to notice her right away. Her classmates notice, but the attention isn't what she'd hoped it would be; as the day goes on, she feels more self-conscious. Her clothes are too bright, her feather boa has too many feathers, and even her name is too hard to write.

The next day, she picks out a plain outfit and tells her mom that her name is too long. She just wants to blend in, with a simple name like the other girls—why couldn't her parents have named her Megan or Bella? But when her mother tells her the meaning behind her name, it gives her the confidence she needs to introduce her classmates to the real Vanessa.

VANESSA BRANTLEY-NEWTON is a self-taught illustrator, doll maker, and crafter who studied fashion illustration at FIT and children's book illustration at the School of Visual Arts in New York. #### SUGGESTED CLASSROOM USES



- Take a picture walk through the book. Ask students to share ways they think Vanessa is special.
- Encourage students to connect to Vanessa by thinking about their own special qualities. Are they the same as Vanessa's?
- ➡ Before reading, ask students to think about ways they express themselves. Do they wear bright and colorful clothing? Do they move their bodies in a certain way? Do they sing songs? Do they write poems or stories? Encourage them to notice the different ways Vanessa expresses herself in the story.
- During the reading, stop at different parts in the story to comment on how Vanessa is feeling. Ask students to identify how they would feel if they were Vanessa. How would they check in with Vanessa if they were her friend?
- At the end of story, have students reflect on what is special about themselves. Is it their name? Is it the special way they wear their hair? Encourage students to share their specialness with another student.
- Vanessa Brantley-Newton uses a variety of media and techniques to create her unique illustrations. Consider exploring the art of collage with your students. Provide newspaper, scrapbook paper, and construction paper. Encourage them to create a butterfly using these materials. Hang the butterflies throughout the classroom.

#### WHAT WOULD YOU WEAR?

Becoming Vanessa celebrates the beauty of being unique. Just like a caterpillar, Vanessa undergoes a metamorphosis. By the end of the story, she realizes that being exactly who she is is the best way to show others her uniqueness.

Encourage your students to design a unique outfit for a special occasion. Once they have drawn their outfit, provide them with craft supplies like fabric, ribbon, felt, sequins, and anything else you have on hand to decorate their design.


## BECOMING VANESSA




