


Welcome, young explorer!

Solve an ancient mystery on page 6.




You escaped the Mummy's Curse! Write this number in the bottom blank.



You solved the Mystery of the Pharaoh! Write this number in the top blank.





Are you ready for your last and greatest test so far? First decode the symbols below for more instructions. When you're done, keep reading!

In ancient Egypt, if your family lost a favorite cat, what would you do to show how sad you were?


HINT: It's something a man might do to his face every day—only you would do it to a different part of your face. Look right above your eyes!


What was one reason that ancient Egyptian food was kind of crunchy? HINT: The desert would get into everything from bread to dessert.

How many mummies were found in the Great Pyramid of Giza? **HINT:** It's less than 10. Grave robbers were VERY good at their jobs.

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
Well, that was an interesting decision. But I'm afraid it was the wrong one!




WELCOME TO THE TOMBS OF ANCIENT EGYPT!

your escape.




