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## WORK REALLY HARD

## LEARN ABOUT COLORS WITH SCIENCE AND ART!

1. Show students a color wheel. Explain that primary colors (blue, yellow, and red) are combined to make secondary colors (purple, green, and orange).
2. Ask students to make a prediction-a hypothesis-about which primary colors combine to make purple, green, and orange.
3. Gather blue, yellow, and red food dye to test out the hypothesis. Try a series of combinations until you get purple, then green, then orange!


## PAINT THE WHOLE SCHOOL PURPLE

Do a school-wide read of THE WORLD NEEDS MORE PURPLE PEOPLE. Each week, select a student to celebrate for helping to make the school a better place. Print out the attached certificate and post it somewhere visible so other students can see it and be inspired.
