OVERVIEW: This bilingual curriculum guide for *The Motorcycle Diaries* offers pre-reading activities, guiding questions, post-reading resources, a suggested student project, and an essay assignment. The guide focuses on the three modes of communication—interpersonal, interpretive and presentational—and also includes discussion prompts for additional titles in the Che Guevara Library that are available in both English and Spanish editions. Students are expected to read *The Motorcycle Diaries* pictured above, and the 2004 movie *The Motorcycle Diaries* can be an additional resource. This new edition of the book published by Seven Stories Press in 2021 features a new introduction by the film's director, Walter Salles.



The Che Guevara Library is a new project from Seven Stories Press to reintroduce the great essays, journals, and diaries of Che Guevara and other essential works from Latin America in both English and Spanish.

TARGET AUDIENCE: This resource is intended for use in upper-level high school Spanish classes and intermediate to upper-level college Spanish courses. The activities and question sets can be used on their own or they can be expanded and adapted. Beginning students will likely need to complete this coursework using both English and Spanish, while advanced students should complete it entirely in Spanish. This curriculum guide only represents a starting point—feel free to adapt assignments to best serve your students.



CAN-DO STATEMENTS: The American Council on the Teaching of Foreign Languages encourages use of “Can-Do” statements in the classroom as a pedagogical tool (see more context and instructions here: actfl.org/resources/ncssfl-actfl-can-do-statements). Use of these statements is optional and is intended to build rationale around lessons and present a clear roadmap for student learning. Please keep in mind that many students may be unfamiliar with the political or economic context of the books in this guide. Consider incorporating informational sources, such as articles or videos, that can enrich the activities in the following section.



The writing collected here ranges from the personal to the political and includes correspondence home during Che's *Motorcycle Diaries* trip as well as his long letter to Fidel Castro after the success of the Cuban revolution in early 1959.

Themes: imperialism, failure, guerrilla warfare, Marxism, revolution, global perspectives

1. In reading these letters, what do you notice about Che's voice? Does it sound like his journals?



Che Guevara's diary of the last year of his life describes efforts to launch a guerrilla insurrection against the military government of Bolivia. The diary was found in his backpack when he was captured by the Bolivian Army in October 1967, and the last entry describes the day before Che's capture, two days before his murder. This edition includes Fidel Castro's "A Necessary Introduction," exposing the lies of an earlier, preemptive edition prepared by the C.I.A. to discredit Che and the Bolivian expedition, as well as the Cuban Revolution itself.



Accompanied by an extensive bibliography of writing, a timeline of his life, and an all-encompassing glossary of individuals, organizations, and publications, the *Che Guevara Reader* provides insights into the historical, political, and cultural context for Che's radicalization.

Themes: solidarity, political theory, imperialism, communism, economic development, national sovereignty, international relations



The sequel to *The Motorcycle Diaries*, these letters, poetry, and other writings document Che's second trip through Latin America, revealing the emergence of a committed revolutionary.

Themes: class disparities, imperialism, revolution, capitalism, poverty, personal transformation



Assembled from his campaign diary, first published in 1963, and later corrected and edited by Che, this definitive account of the Cuban revolutionary war includes short essays and articles published just after the revolution's triumph.

Themes: revolution, warfare, loyalty, betrayal, urban/rural divide, remembrance, sacrifice

Themes: solidarity, sovereignty, humanism, globalization, social change, technological advancement, the individual

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

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
